
Introduction



The Solent Way is a 60-mile long-distance coastal walking route that will take you from the seaside town of Milford-on-Sea past the hustle and bustle of seafronts, quiet yachting harbours, deserted marshland and saltings to finish at Emsworth Harbour. No other path is so awash with naval history.


The Way has been divided into eight sections, each providing a really good day out. Choose between deserted coastal marshes or promenades and candy-floss, seaside picnics or cosy riverside pubs, and shingle beaches with exhilarating views.

There are many places such as Lymington, Beaulieu, Hamble and Emsworth where you can stop along the way

for refreshments, to visit antiques shops, to sample local crafts and foods, or even to stay for a night or two. We have listed a selection of refreshments in rural locations at the end of each section.

This breath-taking route passes by some of the prettiest harbours and creeks in

Hampshire with ferry-rides to take and shingle spits to climb. There are castles and forts to explore, and ships, submarines and museums to visit – and always with the smell and sound of the sea beside you. Walk past some of the finest marshes and lagoons in the south with rare species to look for such as foxtail stonewort, lagoon shrimp and starlet sea anemone.



Near the start of the Way, sitting at the end of a $1^{1/2}$ -mile-long shingle spit is Hurst Castle. It was built in this location Royal Victoria Hospital, Netley by Henry VIII, as its position was ideal

for defending the western passage into the Solent and the vital naval cities of Southampton and Portsmouth. Today, the views of the big ships passing through this narrow point are spectacular.

On the way to Lymington are the marshes and lagoons originally created by the making of a vast number of salterns. These were plots of land laid out as pools and walks, in which sea-water was allowed to evaporate naturally so the salt could be harvested. The lattice-like patterns of the old salt-pans can still clearly be seen.

Further east is Beaulieu Abbey, founded in 1204. Legend tells of how King John oppressed the Cistercian Order only to experience a nightmare in which he was beaten by a group of monks. On waking and still feeling the blows on his back, he decided to make reparation by gifting the Cistercians a tract of land on which to build an abbey.

In the city of Southampton, a fragment of the medieval town wall is still standing. It is also the harbour from which the Pilgrim Fathers, religious dissenters from Nottinghamshire, set sail for the New World in the



Further along, the path passes Royal Victoria Country Park where the first and largest purpose-built hospital was built to care for soldiers serving in the British Empire. It took seven years to build, opened in 1863, was a quarter of a mile long and had 1000 beds. All but the Chapel was demolished in 1966 and the site is now a country park run by Hampshire County Council.

The Solent Way passes through Gosport and Portsmouth where at nearly every

bend of the path you can find a historical rampart, fort, ship, dockyard or building to investigate. Henry VII and Henry VIII made Portsmouth their main naval port.

The Mary Rose was built at about the time that Henry VIII came to the throne (1509) and was one of the first ships able to fire a broadside. She was a firm favourite of his and took part in most of his wars. She was raised in 1982, and is the only 16th C warship on display anywhere in the world.

At the end of the path is Emsworth, a picturesque fishing village set at the top of Chichester Harbour. Once famous for its oysters, it is also remembered as home of PG Wodehouse whose fictional characters took on many local place names, which can still be visited today.

Milford-on-Sea to Lymington

Distance: 9 miles Time: 3-4 hours The Solent Way begins in the seaside town of Milford-on-Sea. It follows the seashore to Hurst Castle Spit, which stretches out to Hurst Castle. From here you can retrace your steps back to the mainland, or catch a ferry (seasonal) to Keyhaven Harbour along

the seawall past the unique Lymington-Keyhaven Nature Reserve, which provides a home for a huge number of wetland birds. plants and animals.

The Way continues to the vachting mecca of Lymington with its pretty cobbled streets hosting many cafés, restaurants and pubs, as well as shops to browse in.

Lymington to Beaulieu

Distance: 10 miles Time: 4-5 hours Cross Lymington River and head inland, with occasional glimpses of the Solent through the trees. Continue into the New Forest to Sowley Pond. Then along the lanes and curl inland to Buckler's Hard village on the Beaulieu River. There is a fragment of an 18th C village remaining here, and a Maritime Museum that tells the story of shipbuilding at Buckler's Hard. Follow the route inland up the east bank of the river to arrive at the Montagu Arms pub in Beaulieu.

Beaulieu to Hythe

Distance: 6 miles Time: 2-3 hours In the village of Beaulieu you can visit the 13th C Beaulieu Abbey, Palace House and the church. Stop to browse in the shops or, just off the route, tour the National Motor Museum.

Heading out of the village, the path climbs up onto Beaulieu Heath, an area of moorland and the chance of spotting a nightjar, snipe or redshank.

Follow on down an old twisting lane, to Hythe and the huge drowned estuary of Southampton Water.

Hythe to Hamble

Distance: 7 miles

Time: 2-3 hours At Hythe Pier catch the ferry to Southampton's Town Quay where there are many places to visit. Leave Southampton and cross the Itchen Bridge to Woolston, once a great aircraft and shipbuilding area. The route returns to the shoreline passing Westwood Woodland Park, Netley Castle, the ruins of Netley Abbey and the popular Royal Victoria Country Park, Stop for a ride on the miniature railway or play on the beach before continuing along the shore and up the River Hamble to the delightful waterfront village of Hamble-le-Rice.

Hamble to Hillhead

Distance: 5 miles Time: 2 hours Take the ferry to Warsash and walk south to the mouth of the River Hamble, and the Hook-with-Warsash Nature Reserve with its intertidal mudflats, shoreline and a variety of habitats to explore. The route continues to the low sand cliffs of Chilling and Bronwich with large stretches of undeveloped open farmland beyond, before reaching the Titchfield Haven National Nature Reserve. This reserve of reedbeds, saltings and marshes is another great birdwatching site with hides, a tea room and a Visitor Centre. It's only a short distance from here to

Hillhead to Gosport

Distance: 8 miles Time: 3-4 hours From the tiny harbour of Hillhead, the Way follows a long shingle beach to Lee-on-the-Solent and its promenade. At Stokes Bay you are entering an area oozing with naval history - you can see a fort out to sea and a land fort at the western end of the bay.

Dip inland before returning to the water's edge at Gosport, where there are excellent views across to Portsmouth.

Visit the exciting Royal Navy Submarine Museum with several submarines to investigate, or 'Explosion!' - the awardwinning museum of Naval firepower. Take the ferry across to Portsmouth.

Gosport to Langstone

Distance: 12 miles Time: 5 hours To the west of the path are the historic docks and three fantastic maritime museums and many other attractions in the city of Portsmouth.

Back to the water's edge, the Way goes past the neck of the harbour then Clarence Pier, with its bright lights and arcades, and along to Southsea.

Leave the deckchairs and candyfloss behind and enter the calm of Langstone Harbour and the wild Farlington Marshes. This expanse of coastal grassland is a haven for migrating birds.

Langstone to Emsworth

Distance: 3 miles This section of the Way runs along the shoreline past the old waterside village of Langstone with its delightful heritage quayside, pubs and a picturesque millhouse.


