## What is The Watercress Way?

This 27 mile trail links the **communities** of Alresford, Kings Worthy, South Wonston and Sutton Scotney, partly in the South Downs National Park.



The Watercress Way was named after the watercress farming, which boomed after the 19<sup>th</sup> C. Mid-Hants (Watercress Line) and Didcot–Newbury – Southampton Railway lines were built. Their Closure (1963-1973) led to

abandoned or destroyed tracks. The **Watercress** Line was opened fully for heritage trains in 1985. The Watercress Way charity, aims to increase access to more of the 14 miles of closed railway track. By 2020 almost 6 miles was opened to walkers. Most may be cycled and ridden. The railway sections are linked together by footpaths, bridleways, and minor roads; many of which are historic livestock droves. The trail intersects or follows St Swithun's Way, Itchen Way, Three Castles Path, Arle Valley and Millennium Trails.

## Heritage and Conservation

The trail goes across beautiful rolling downland, through woods and along the rare chalk rivers of the Arle, Itchen, Candover and Dever, all **SSSI's**. Look for brown trout, otters, and damselflies. The old railways and droves are also important **wildlife habitats** and **corridors**, with beech, ash, wild garlic, and bluebells.



You may see buzzards, red kites, deer, and signs of badgers and dormice. Worthy Down Halt platforms are designated a SINC for its rare assemblage of flora.

Look out for **artefacts**: bridges, sleepers, telegraph poles & wire

stanchions. Active management by trustees and volunteers, working with Hampshire County Council, includes regular cutting, building log piles, planting, and clearing sites e.g. Wonston Bridge at Sutton Scotney.



### **The Watercress Way Access**

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There are **multiple access** points to the trail. Printable guides are on our website: clockwise, and anticlockwise, and shorter circular walks from the main gateways of New Alresford, South Wonston, Kings Worthy and Sutton Scotney. All have **bus services** and public carparks. The trail passes the heritage train station of Alresford, where the Watercress Line links to Alton and its mainline trains to London.




Apart from nearby Winchester, there are over 12 ٠ pubs and hotels on or near the trail, many offering accommodation, especially in Alresford.
